RESOLUTION OF OF THE BOARD COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF BROWARD COUNTY, FLORIDA. COMMITING TO THE CONSERVATION OF ROADSIDE WILD FLOWERS ON STATE AND COUNTY ROADWAYS INSTRUCTING COUNTY STAFF TO PARTNER WITH LOCAL MUNICIPALITIES, THE FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION, AND ADJACENT PROPERTY OWNERS TO PLAN AND **IMPLEMENT** ROADSIDE MANAGEMENT **PRACTICES INCREASE** TO VISIBILITY AND **ENJOYMENT** OF FLORIDA WILDFLOWERS AND REQUESTING THAT A CERTIFIED COPY OF THIS RESOLUTION BE TRANSMITTED TO THE NATIONAL WILDLIFE FEDERATION, THE **FLORIDA** DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION. AND

WHEREAS, the natural beauty of native wildflowers in Broward County can be enjoyed by everyone, can attract guests and benefit commerce, environmental health, and public well-being; and

WHEREAS, the enjoyment of native wildflowers is an occasion for all Broward County and community leaders to unite for the benefit of everyone; and

WHEREAS, many naturally beautiful species of native wildflowers, including Coreopsis, the state wildflower, as depicted upon the state wildflower license tag, are already prominently displayed along Broward County's roadways; and

WHEREAS, increasing the visibility of native wildflowers in Broward County is consistent with the vision of NatureScape Broward, and goals of many individuals, businesses, schools, and community-based organizations; and

WHEREAS, the presence of native wildflowers is essential to the fitness of native pollinator species necessary for productive and profitable farms and forests; and

WHEREAS, in the spring of 1513, Juan Ponce de Leon named this beautiful place La Florida, Land of Flowers, because of the wealth of native wildflowers; and

WHEREAS, in the year 2013, native wildflowers will be a prominent icon of Florida's and Broward County's quincentennial celebration of Spain in Florida; and

WHEREAS, it is desirable and attainable to experience the beauty of many more native wildflowers by reducing the frequency and extent of roadside mowing; and

WHEREAS, the Florida Wildflower Foundation's La Florida program of the provides planting grants of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) for agencies and organizations within counties that have adopted an acceptable Wildflower Resolution; and

WHEREAS, Griffin Road, Orange Drive, and Coconut Creek Parkway are ideal candidates to establish pilot project corridors for management of native wildflowers; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF BROWARD COUNTY, FLORIDA:

- Section 1. The Board of County Commissioners of Broward County commits and encourages others to commit to the conservation of roadside native wildflowers on state and county roadways.
- Section 2. The Board of County Commissioners of Broward County directs County staff to partner with local municipalities and the Florida Department of Transportation and adjacent property owners to plan and implement roadside management practices that will increase the visibility and enjoyment of Florida native

wildflowers, and to pursue partnerships for pilot project corridors for management of
native wildflowers.
Section 3. The Board of County Commissioners of Broward County directs the
County Administrator to provide a certified copy of this resolution to the National Wildlife
Federation, the Florida Department of Transportation, the Broward League of Cities,
and the Florida Wildflower Foundation.
Section 4. <u>EFFECTIVE DATE</u> .
This Resolution shall become effective upon adoption.
